
Signing SB 582 for Maui Recovery FY24 Wildfire Emergency Appropriations and Maui Recovery Update

SB582: Ensuring Maui recovery for FY24

\$362M in Emergency Appropriations for Maui wildfire relief for FY24 \$292M for non- FEMA eligible families
 \$65M into our extended One 'Ohana Fund

55 families currently participating

Our Maui Recovery Update

- ✓ NCS individuals has fallen from 7,796 to ~1,743 (~78% decrease)
- ✓ First family moved into Ke Ao Maluhia at Maui Lani — fully complete in July
- ✓ Groundbreaking for 450 units at Ka La'i
 Ola
- ✓ Cost reduction with FEMA aid, including debris clearance and housing development
- Passage of SB2919 to empower county enforcement to crack down on ~75K illegal STRS

Building Permanent Housing

- ✓ Moved families into Ke Ao Maluhia
- Purchased <u>175</u> units at Hale 'O Lā'ie (formerly Haggai Institute)
- ✓ Broke ground on the <u>450</u> units in Ka
 La'i Ola move-in on August 1
- Coordinating with FEMA to build more (Kilohana), 169 units planned ask for 1,000
- Securing HUD Community
 Development Block Grant Disaster
 Recovery funds
