Background and Summary

Applicant Background

Until 1997, no institution had focused or acknowledged the history about Africana people amalgamation contributions to island history including WWII Pacific Theater. Since 1997, dozens of dedicated volunteers under the leadership of kupunas Deloris Guttman & Ernest Golden, who died in 2023 at 95 years old, has been sharing Hawaii Africana settlers' untold stories in the community from Waianae to Waimanalo, all arround Oahu.

In collaboration with community partners: NPS Arizona Memorial Monument, Hawaii Judiciary History Center, Pacific Aviation Museum including Honolulu MOCA Municipal Gallery displays which began in 2006 to showcase history about Africana settlers for the general public.

In 2018, Honolulu City Council approved GIA funding for the Museum to develop its Hawaiian Africana Youth Enrichment (HAYEP) in-school curriculum for middle and high school students. The HAYEP curriculum have been implemented in low to moderate income communities (James Campbell, Radford, Moanalua, Castle High schools and Moanalua Middle School engaging over 2500 students.

Funding Request Purpose

In 2023, the organization's Institute for Museum Library Science(IMLS) grant ended. Although, we have had dozens of requests to implement the HAYEP curriculum in new schools as well as the ones listed above. We are unable to accommodate teachers who are requesting our program services due to lack of funds for a program educator and student interns to provide community service in social studies and history classrooms. The main HAYEP component is to engage students regardless of academic abilities to uplift students with

low self esteem which has hampered their academic success since COVID for underrespresented students (i.e. Pacific Islanders, Native Hawaiians, Africana, & Filipino students).

Geographic Coverage Served

Since the organization's inception in 1997, we have provided volunteer community service to DOE's K8 classrooms reading books to students and and worked with librarians on Hawaii Island, Oahu, & Kauai providing booklists that consist of ethnically diverse cultural books from K to 12 grades.

The organization partnered with the Zonta Club members to provide community services to Waipahu

Elementary and Palolo Elmentary Schools

for four years. We worked with the principals in establishing a parent literacy group. Additionally, we read books to grades K6 monthly

Public Purpose or Need Served

The public purpose and need, the organization's community engagement with DOE students in Hawaii has create a stronger, more supportive learning that has provide students with holistic support that extends beyond the classroom . For the past 10 years, HAYEP has been implemented in Moanalua Middle School history and social studies classrooms every school year. The core competencies: 1) engage students in writing and sharing their personal reflections and feelings; 2) relationship skills, feelings of safety, pride, & connectedness within the school to build on the student's sense of belonging; and 3) engage students in exchange of ideas to empasize the 4Cs: a) critical thinking; b) collaboration; c) communication; and d) creativity. These 4Cs are core skills are needed in today's society and workforce.

Target Population Served

The target population that the organization serve are K12 students in low to moderate income communities.

Summary and Outcomes

Measure(s) of **Effectiveness**

The intended Outcomes for HAYEP: Improve grade test scores, improve school attendance, and complete homework assignments on time, Additionally, help students to build self-awareness, social awareness obtaining positive social behaviors to reduce problems such as bullying and fighting in an effortto minimizing disruptive behaviors.

Projected Annual Timeline

Project annual timeline in a school year: Fall Semester and Spring Semester. History and Social Teachers invite the organization to implement the HAYEP curriculum in their classrooms. The process begins with the Program Educator (PE) meeting with the teacher grade chair to share the components of the lesson plan for six (6) 45 minutes class sessions in a school day. The next step, schedule a date to implement the curriculum. For example, James Campbell High program teachers want their 9th and 10th grade students to take part in the curriculum. The PE's preparation for training college interns and class preparation takes a few weeks. In this case, the PE will work with teachers for an entire semester which includes critiquing class sessions with each teacher before and after. The HAYEP curriculum coincide with DOE's criteria for each grade level.

Quality Assurance and Evaluation Plans

The evaluation plan consist of a qualitative three-question survey form about the subject that each student complete after a 45 minutes class session.

Scope of Work

The scope of HAYEP's in-school program social studies topics for example: "American and Hawaiian history," students were required to reveiw the 14th and 15th Amentments to the U.S. Constitution to learn about historic context to provide general knowledge about people, places and events. Secondly, students learn to write a short narrative about the amendments, This execise prepared students to reflect on their cultural heritage and write about it. More importantly, engaging students to write about their own reflections stimulated their emotions and critical thinking skills that demonstrate the power of "awe" opening up new perspectives inspiring hope and aspirations. Emotional learning is a 'human factor' that is necessary for students' academic and career success producing leaders for tomorrow.

In 2018, the organization was granted by Honolulu City Council GIA funds, the amount of \$75,000 for hiring a program educator to develop the Hawaiian Africana Youth Enrichment Program (HAYEP) in-school social studies curriculum and implement it in schools. HAYEP curriculum was implemented in James Campbell and Radford High Schools in 2018/2019 school year. At the completion of the GIA grant, the organization continued to conduct in-school classroom sessions with part-time staff, volunteers. In 2019, the organization

received its first 3-year federal grant from the institute for Museums Library Service (IMLS) for \$150,000 that ended in 2023. The grant's matching fund consisted of the volunteer administrator ink-kind services which

total over \$350,000.
