Emergency Food and Shelter Program (EFSP) Overview for Hawai'i Island United Way

The Emergency Food and Shelter Program (EFSP) is a federally funded initiative administered by FEMA and governed by a National Board chaired by United Way Worldwide. It provides supplemental funding to local nonprofits and public agencies to support individuals and families facing economic emergencies. Purpose

EFSP funds are designed to:

Provide emergency food (meals or groceries)
Offer temporary shelter (including hotel/motel stays)

Prevent homelessness through rental/mortgage assistance

Avoid utility shutoffs with utility bill support

Cover transportation costs related to food or shelter access

Purchase essential supplies and equipment for feeding or sheltering

Local Administration

Hawai'i Island United Way plays a key role in administering EFSP funds locally by:

Convening a Local Board composed of community leaders and service providers Advertising funding opportunities to eligible nonprofits and public agencies Reviewing applications and allocating funds based on community needs

Ensuring compliance and reporting to the National Board

Background and Summary

Applicant Background

Founded in 1967, Hawai'i Island United Way has served as a trusted community funder, supporting nonprofit organizations that serve the island's most vulnerable residents. Through our Community Impact Grants, we distributed over \$218,000 last year—raised primarily through local workplace campaigns and special events. We also administer funding for the Emergency Food and Shelter Program (EFSP) in partnership with FEMA and United Way Worldwide, helping ensure critical resources reach those in need. In addition to grantmaking, we operate a Nonprofit Network Hub that fosters collaboration and capacity-building among local service providers. In 2025, we launched a Furniture Bank out of our office space to support individuals and families transitioning into stable housing by providing essential household items

Funding Request Purpose

Goals 1. Secure Funding from state for EFSP* on Hawai'i Island Ensure Hawai'i Island United Way can fund and administer the Emergency Food and Shelter Program (EFSP) to support vulnerable residents. 2. Support Local Nonprofits and Social Service Agencies Strengthen the capacity of local organizations to provide essential services such as food, shelter, and supportive resources to individuals and families experiencing or at risk of hunger and homelessness. Objectives 1. Administer EFSP Locally Establish Hawai'i Island United Way as the administrator of EFSP funds, ensuring equitable and efficient distribution to qualified service providers. 2. Expand Service Reach and Impact Use EFSP funds to supplement and expand existing programs that provide emergency food, shelter, and supportive services across Hawai'i Island. *Background regarding EFSP Funds: Funding: The EFSP is funded by federal resources and is not contingent on a presidential disaster declaration. This means it can assist individuals facing non-disasterrelated emergencies. Services Provided: The program can be used for a variety of services, including: Food Assistance: Providing served meals or groceries. Shelter: Offering lodging in mass shelters, hotels, or motels for up to 30 days. Financial Assistance: Covering one month of rent or mortgage payments to prevent eviction or foreclosure, as well as utility assistance. Transportation Costs: Assisting with transportation related to food or shelter needs. Emergency Repairs: Funding minor repairs essential for mass feeding or sheltering facilities. Sources: Allocation of Funds The EFSP National Board is responsible for allocating funds to jurisdictions (counties and cities) based on the most recent national population, unemployment, and poverty data. Local boards then review applications and award grants to organizations that provide services to those in need. Geographic Coverage Served

Hawai'i County, with special focus on hard to reach rural areas, such as Ka'u.

Public Purpose or **Need Served** Public Good:

This grant supports the well-being of Hawai'i Island's most vulnerable residents by ensuring access to emergency food, shelter, and basic household resources. It strengthens the local safety net, promotes housing stability, and fosters community resilience through coordinated nonprofit efforts.

Need to Be Served:

The 2025 Alice Report by County shows that on Hawai'i Island, 48% of households live below the ALICE Threshold, meaning they are either living in poverty or are ALICE (Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed) households. These families earn above the federal poverty level but still cannot afford basic necessities such as housing, food, child care, transportation, and health care.

The delay in federal Emergency Food and Shelter Program (EFSP) funding has left local nonprofits without critical resources to serve these families. This grant request seeks to fill that gap, allowing Hawai'i Island United Way to continue administering EFSP funds and support initiatives like the Furniture Bank and Nonprofit Network Hub, which directly assist ALICE households and those in poverty.

Target Population Served Alice families and families who live in poverty.

Summary and Outcomes

Improved housing stability through coordinated support services, including access to household items via the Furniture Bank.

Compliance rate of funded agencies with reporting and documentation requirements.

Grantee satisfaction and feedback collected through post-award surveys and quarterly convenings.

Collect final service and financial data.

Evaluate program outcomes.

Submit final reports to the State and share impact with stakeholders.

Quality Assurance and Evaluation Plans

Quality Assurance and Evaluation Plans

Hawai'i Island United Way will implement a comprehensive quality assurance and evaluation framework to ensure the effective administration of EFSP funds and continuous improvement of program outcomes.

Monitoring

Organizational Support Staff will conduct regular check-ins with funded agencies to monitor progress, troubleshoot challenges, and ensure compliance with program guidelines.

Regular reporting will be required from grantees, including service outputs (e.g., meals served, nights of shelter provided) and financial expenditures.

Evaluation

President and CPO will lead the evaluation process by analyzing service data, financial reports, and feedback from grantees and clients.

Key performance indicators (KPIs) will include number of individuals served, timeliness of fund disbursement, and client outcomes related to food security and housing stability.

Evaluation findings will be shared with the EFSP Local Board and used to inform future funding decisions and program improvements.

Continuous Improvement

Feedback loops will be established through quarterly convenings of funded agencies via the Nonprofit Network Hub.

Lessons learned and best practices will be documented and integrated into future RFPs, training materials, and technical assistance offerings.

Adjustments to program processes will be made based on evaluation findings and stakeholder input to enhance efficiency, equity, and impact.

Hawai'i Island United Way will serve as the lead agency to administer Emergency Food and Shelter Program (EFSP) funds on behalf of the State of Hawai'i. The scope includes the following:

Responsibilities of President and CPO

Act as the fiscal and administrative agent for EFSP funds on Hawai'i Island.

Ensure compliance with State of Hawai'i EFSP guidelines and reporting requirements.

Convene and manage the EFSP Local Board to guide funding decisions.

Oversee equitable distribution of funds to eligible nonprofit and governmental agencies.

Monitor program performance and ensure accountability across funded partners.

Proposed Staffing and Service Capacity

State and Federal

Hawai'i Island United Way will administer the Emergency Food and Shelter Program (EFSP) through a streamlined staffing model that ensures strategic leadership and administrative support. Leadership and Oversight

The program will be led by President and Chief Program Officer (CPO), Jessica Thompson, who brings over a decade of nonprofit administration experience, including five years on Hawai'i Island. Her leadership includes successful management of federally funded programs passed through both the State and County, such as a \$1 million Federal Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) grant and a CDC Health Equity Grant. Jessica will provide strategic oversight, supervise program implementation, ensure compliance with state guidelines, and convene the EFSP Local Board to guide funding decisions.

Clerical and Administrative Support

A dedicated Organizational Support Staff will assist with clerical tasks essential to the program's operations, including:

Scheduling meetings and site visits

Preparing and distributing application materials

Managing data entry and filing of reports

Assisting with documentation and recordkeeping

Supervision, Training, and Administrative Direction

The President and CPO will directly supervise all aspects of the EFSP program, including oversight of Organizational Support Staff. She will provide training to grantees on compliance and reporting requirements, facilitate onboarding, and ensure that all administrative processes align with program goals and state expectations. Regular internal reviews and team meetings will support quality assurance and continuous improvement.

This staffing pattern ensures that the EFSP grant is administered with strong leadership, efficient clerical support, and a clear structure for accountability and program success.
